Physical Facet-headed sundial standing on a high, wide-spreading base, consisting of three moulded steps. The **Description:** support of the dial is hexagonal. At top and bottom the facet-head has five sides and in the centre ten

sides. The dials are hollowed out with figures of various shapes. In one the gnomon is formed by the nose of a grotesque face. The under surfaces have no dials, but are decorated with the royal arms and the initials of Charles I and his queen Henrietta Maria, for whom Charles had the dial made.

Person or event commemorated:

History of The sundial was made by John Mylne, the king's master mason, in 1633, assisted by Mylne's sons, Commission John and Alexander, '"for which he was paid the sum of £408, 15s. 6d. Scots." The dial and pedestal

measure 6 feet 7 inches high, and the total height, including the base, is 10 feet, and the width at the ground is 10 feet 3 inches. It is stated that this dial was lying broken and uncared for, and that it was put in order by command of the queen.' (Castellated and Domestic Architecture, Vol. V) (1)

Description: Dolphins (in pairs, one behind the other) support the sides of the pediment, and female figures (each holding a garland) recline upon it. Along the frieze are metopes carved with the cypher of Charles II, thistles, the Honours of Scotland [crossed sword and sceptre with crown above] and saltires (W. to E. : saltire / thistle / Honours / Charles II cypher / Charles II cypher / Honours / thistle / saltire). Either side of the entrance is a pair of Roman Doric columns. On the stone bases below these are lion masks

(originally four on each base).

Person or event commemorated:

History of Gifford et al in 'The Buildings of Scotland' suggest that the doorway may come from one of two Royal **Commission** visits, in 1617 and 1633.

MacGibbon and Ross, in 'Castellated and Domestic Architecture', Vol.IV, state that the doorway was formerly an entrance to the palace gardens through the wall which had enclosed them. They say that it is 'possibly one of the two gates referred to in the "contracts betwixt Sir William Bruce of Balcaskie, His Majesty's Surveyor-General; Sir William Sharp of Stainiehill, His Majesty's Cash-keeper; and Robert Mylne, His Majesty's Master Mason, for the reparation and building of the palace of Holyrood".'The contract was to build two walls, ' "and in the middle of each of the said side walls opposite to each other, to build and finish a handsome beautiful gate in orderly pillar work, as shall be designed by the said surveyor." This contract is dated Canongate and Edinburgh, 11th and 12th March 1672.' (1)
