Each half of the shield is surmounted by a crown and a helmet, with a cat sejant on top of the helmet on the dexter side, and a swan on the other. There is foliage behind. The shield is flanked by a savage on the dexter side, wreathed about the waist with laurel, and holding a club in his right hand; and by a swan on the sinister side.

To either side of the coat of arms is a winged angel head above the capitals of the columns. A young tree with oak [?] leaves and acorns grow up each column and supports four medallions on each side; these have crowns and names.

The base has a winged angel head and swag of fruit, flanked by a skull and crossbones on each side.

The shield is surmounted by a helmet with a wreath and crest. The crest represents a wild boar caught in the clefts of an oak, with a lock and chain holding them together.
