



Kirriemuir Cemetery, February 2012

Minutes. First date 9<sup>th</sup> Aug 1855 ends 6<sup>th</sup> May 1895.

By 24<sup>th</sup> December 1857 complete with trees and shrubs planted. Open for interment 10<sup>th</sup> April 1858.

Initially there were six locations considered and test pits were dug at all locations; that chosen was 'on the front of the Hill between the Quarry Road and Tillyloss'. This was on Kinnordy land.

Cost of the land was £300 and costs £550.

Half of the ground was for free interment as described by law. The old graveyard was closed for interment 10<sup>th</sup> August 1858. 1868 began discussions on an extension to the cemetery.

- 1910 Plan of cemetery with notations on various lairs and alterations to the map. It shows the boundaries of the original cemetery and the 'new' extension. There does not appear to be a reference number showing although there is a file reference for some detail (P&R file 4.11.34 dated March 1990). This map is in a glass wall cabinet in the cemetery lodge. (Duplicated in B1 Mapped Sources)
- 1979 Plan of extension of 1979 with notations. Carries reference number BW/34-2/R4 or RA. This map is in a glass wall cabinet in the cemetery lodge. (Duplicated in B1 Mapped Sources).
- 2005 Angus Local Plan for Kirriemuir land set aside for an extension; showing cemetery and agreed extension not yet set up.

# C1A PRINCIPAL HOUSE OR BUILDING:

The Lodge situated at the main entrance is a single storied building in local red sandstone with a pitched tiled roof. A short flight of steps leads to the front door. It is used as a waiting room and to house the plan of the cemetery.

Originally, this was the Keeper's Lodge. (Refer B2 Primary & Documentary Sources, Angus Archives K1/4/7-10 Kirriemuir Parochial Board Cemetery Minutes.

C1B OFFICES (stables, outbuildings, etc):

Attached to the lodge is an outbuilding (double garage) used to house various tools for the maintenance workers.

C1C HOME FARM OR MAINS:

C1D BOUNDARIES (External & internal; estate walls, ha-has, park fences etc.):

To the N, E and W, the boundary is a stone wall approximately 1.75m high but dropping on the E to varying, lower heights topped with iron railings. To the S of the old section, the lower stone wall continues topped with iron railings.

The W boundary of high stone wall continues along the new (1922) section.

The new section (1922) is bordered on the E and S by beech hedges about 1.75m high.

# C1E GATES/GATE LODGES:

Refer section above C1A Principal Building for details of the Lodge. To the E and to the W of the lodge, double wrought iron gates give access to the older section of the cemetery.

Also to the W of the lodge and slightly S, another pair of gates gives access to the newer part of the cemetery.

At the N of the cemetery, there is a single pedestrian wrought iron gate giving access from Kirriemuir Hill. From the car park at the N of the cemetery a pair of gates with gateposts allows access for cars. To the E, there is a single pedestrian gate.

C1F GARDEN BUILDINGS (Summer houses, view houses, temples, grottoes etc):

A pavilion lies to the NE of the lodge. This is a single storey wooden building with a pitched

wooden roof. It is open to the S overlooking the Strathmore Valley and the Sidlaw Hills.

# C1G CHAPELS/MAUSOLEUMS/BURIAL GROUINDS:

The whole of the site is a cemetery. There are no mausoleums. There is no chapel.

At the N of the site, there is a war memorial for the 1914-18 war. This is of grey granite and shows a Highland soldier in combat dress including rifle.

A smaller plain inscribed stone carries the memorial for 1939-45.

There are no formal terraces. The site, being on a slope, is terraced into separate sections.

In the quarry section to the E, there are several stairways. Shorter sets of steps are used as required between the various levels.

C1N WALLED GARDENS (Including potting sheds, bothies, glasshouse ranges etc.):

C1P AVENUES, CARRIAGE DRIVES, ORNAMENTAL WALKS, SERVICE DRIVES ETC:

The main drive enters from Brechin Road along Cemetery Road and leads to the lodge. It is lined on both sides by pollarded lime trees. At the junction with Brechin Road there are stone gate posts.

From this main drive, carriage drives enter various parts of the cemetery giving access to vehicles over the entire site.

A car park is to the N of the cemetery and allows access to one of the avenues through double gates.

# C1Q ROCKERIES:

There is no formal rockery. Part of the area to the E was built in to an old quarry and as such forms a natural rockery.

In the quarry section to the east, the layout includes shrubbery.

Mature shrubs are abundant throughout the cemetery.

Within the lawn there is an area of mature shrubs.

There are many trees set randomly across the site including several consistent with the age of the cemetery.

In the quarry area, there is a small group of trees.

The lawn is bordered by two rows of young trees.

The main drive is lined by pollarded lime trees donated by Mr Smith of Aberdeen in 1901.

From the N gates, there is a view to the Angus Glens.

D. SUMMARY HISTORY OF THE SITE This section should be set out in chronological form and should include information on the way the site has developed and changed since it was first recorded, using dates and maps where possible. The names of owners, architects or designers involved, and relevant historical events should be recorded, and the sources noted.

In 1855 discussions were started about the need for a new burial ground. A committee of nine men was set up to implement the proposal of a new cemetery. Although the names of the committee are given in the 'Regality of Kirriemuir' page 276, those of the architect and designer are not recorded. In March 1858 the new cemetery opened and from that August no further burials were allowed at the old Kirriemuir churchyard.

By 1870 the cemetery needed to be expanded and documents and plans refer to the 'original' and 'new' cemetery. David Orr (2009) states that the Lime trees along Cemetery Road were donated by a Mr Smith of Aberdeen in 1901. These have subsequently been managed as pollarded trees.

Following World War 1 the town's war memorial was erected in the cemetery and in 1929 the cemetery's layout was revised. J M Barrie, who died in 1937, was interred in the cemetery in the family grave. Names of the casualties of World War 2 were added to a memorial at the close of the war.

In 1979 the cemetery was extended again and included in the 2005 Angus Local Plan for Kirriemuir is provision for future expansion.
