BANCHORY - TERNAN PARISH.

DOMESTIC SETTLEMENT, HOWE OF CORRICHIE. Spread out along the N. side of the valley of the Burn of Corrichie, in the stretch marked "Howe of Corrichie" on the 6-in. O. S. map and about 400 yds. N. of the burn, there are some traces of a settlement which, though of primitive appearance, is unlikely to be ancient. The ruins of a small house, an enclosure some 60 ft. in diameter med out by a foundation of boulders, field-divisions, and piles of gathered stones were noted, together with a hollow track.

No other antiquities were observed in this area, which was probably unfavourable for human habitation at all periods owing to the thinness of the soil and the prevalence of superficial stones, and no further search need be made when the Inventory is prepared.
