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PREFACE

This Guide is published to mark the Jubilee of the National Monuments Record of Scotland, an event which is also being signalled by an exhibition. Fifty years ago, in 1941, its precursor, the Scottish National Buildings Record, was founded. In their Introduction Ian Gow and Graham Ritchie tell a fascinating story of an almost incongruous birth in the violent and austere days of the Second World War. They tell of the growth of the Record, leading to the vigorously active state of the collection and data-base today. This large and composite national archive of Scotland's archaeological sites and historic buildings is of a kind which is unique in Britain. It ranges from late seventeenth-century manuscripts and original design drawings by most of Scotland's leading architects to work of more recent times, including archaeological excavation- and survey-reports.

The catalogue, which forms the bulk of the following text, is the beginning of a process which will take many years to accomplish. It does not include the very considerable holdings of the NMRS Library, and it cannot cover the mass of holdings of the collections that emanate from the field investigations of the Royal Commission (RCAHMS) itself. It does, however, provide a cumulative list of the historical and deposited collections that add so much zest to the content of the Record.

Finally, any introduction to a catalogue and exhibition that celebrate fifty years of achievement in the Record in Scotland must include mention of the name of Kitty Cruft, who moves into, no doubt busy, retirement as the Exhibition opens. The wit, erudition, dedication and leadership of Miss Cruft have served and inspired generations of architectural historians working in Scotland. She will be sorely missed, and the Record, as it continues to grow and expand its scope, will bear witness to her achievements.

Editorial Notes and Acknowledgements

The alphabetically-arranged list of entries which forms the main text of this publication was compiled from catalogue-slips relating to the historical and other deposited collections in the NMRS. Each entry begins with the title of the collection (usually appearing as the location which is the main subject, or provenance, of the collection, or occasionally with the architect or originator of the subjects described therein); there follows a brief description of the collection's contents, in some cases accompanied by summary biographical or contextual notes; the final element, printed in italics, indicates, as appropriate, the date and source of acquisition, or copying, together with details of the NMRS accession number or Society of Antiquaries of Scotland MS number. The reader is asked to note particularly that the appearance of a location in this catalogue does not in any way imply that all the Record material relevant to the location is listed here: conversely, the absence of any location from the catalogue does not necessarily signify the lack of evidence relating to it elsewhere in the Record.

For the production of this book the Commission is indebted to many people, a special word of thanks for outside assistance being due to Mr Maurice Brown, Professor Alistair Rowan and Dr David Walker, who contributed to the Introduction; and to Mrs Jill Lever and Dr Howard Colvin, whose advice was invaluable in formulating the entries in the catalogue. INTRODUCTION

In 1991 the National Monuments Record of Scotland will celebrate its Jubilee as successor to the Scottish National Buildings Record, founded on 19 May 1941. The year, perhaps, gives a clue to its original grim purpose. It was set up during the Second World War to make an emergency record of Scotland's historic architecture in anticipation of its possible destruction through enemy action. The Scottish body was the counterpart of the National Buildings Record in London, but, while they embraced the same ideals, the former inevitably took on a local colouring.

The history of the London Record, founded in February 1941, is a remarkable story of private initiative on the part of England's architects and has been recounted elsewhere by Stephen Croad.1 In their initial enthusiasm, it was intended that the Record should cover not only England and Wales, but also Scotland. However, the difficulties in raising private funds to augment the slender grant which was all the Treasury could spare in wartime, meant that it soon became obvious that they could not hope to tackle Scotland. Lord Reith, the Minister of Works, who had been instrumental in gaining governmental support for the scheme, being a Scot, was naturally anxious to secure equivalent coverage for Scotland, the more so, because her industrial heartlands and fragile communications carried across bridges made her a prime target. A letter from the Saltire Society in March 1941 helped to stir the Edinburgh branch of the Ministry of Works into activity.

Although the government was determined that the Scottish body should be independent and distanced from the Ministry of Works, it was realised that the foundation of the Edinburgh Record might require more direct encouragement than that in London, which had been swept along on a tide of enthusiasm by the Royal Institute of British Architects. It was initially felt that the functions might be carried out by the Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historical Monuments of Scotland. However, this body's much reduced

wartime establishment made such a solution impracticable (although, of course, this was to be the eventual outcome).

The first step in the creation of the new body was the appointment of a suitable Chairman. The Marquess of Bute was the unanimous choice of Lord Reith's advisers, because both the Marquess and his father had an outstanding record in preserving Scotland's historic buildings. It was also hoped, in view of the shortage of funds, that the Marquess might give financial support to the venture. Lord Reith soon discovered that Lord Bute had no intention of being merely a figurehead, as he was a seasoned campaigner in the cause of Scotland's historic architecture. Whereas his father, the third Marquess, had devoted much energy to saving individual outstanding medieval buildings, Lord Bute had been an important pioneer in his appreciation of the architectural value that groups of relatively modest buildings can provide. In spite of their historic interest, these houses were all too often threatened with destruction because they did not meet current housing standards, and Lord Bute was impatient with the attitude of the Scottish Local Authorities who lacked the imagination to realise that, for a relatively modest outlay, such houses could be retained and brought up to standard. Incensed by a spate of demolitions in Fife, Lord Bute established 'The Friends of Falkland' to front his purchase of many threatened buildings in that historic Royal Burgh.

Lord Reith doubtless hoped that Lord Bute would have been delighted to accept the Chairmanship of a body with interests so attuned to his own. He must therefore have been acutely disappointed by Bute's reply, which stated that he saw little point in the proposed Record unless it had powers to protect historic buildings akin to the existing scheduling of Ancient Monuments, and that the average Scottish Local Authority posed a no less serious threat to ancient buildings than the Luftwaffe. The Marquess also singled out the existing legislation in Scotland, which encouraged owners of unoccupied historic houses to remove the roofs in order to avoid paying rates. In spite of attempts to mollify him, the Marquess responded with named examples of exactly the kind of destruction

that he deplored and went so far as to suggest that the Record, in pin-pointing the existence of historic buildings, might serve only to hasten their destruction by Local Authorities. The civil servants in Edinburgh began to search about for a more compliant candidate. until matters were smoothed over through Lord Reith's diplomacy and a reminder of the urgency of the task. Lord Bute, with the assistance of Reginald Fairlie, his consultant architect, drew up a list of members of the proposed Scottish Council who were to direct the National Buildings Record's work. The list of names, with their attached comments, demonstrates the range of interests that they hoped to harness and shows the geographical spread of representation which they sought:

'List of Proposed Members of National Buildings Records Council

Lord Hamilton of Dalzell. Chairman of the Royal Fine Arts Commission.

R Fairlie Esq., Architect. Member of the Ancient Monuments Board and the Ancient Monuments Commission.

D Baird Smith Esq., LL D. President of the Scottish Text Society, Glasgow (who could represent the West side of the country).

Stanley Cursiter Esq., OBE. Director of the National Gallery, Edinburgh.

F C Mears Esq., Architect (who has done a good deal of reconstruction work and town planning).

W N Mackenzie Esq., D Litt. Lecturer in Scottish History, University of Edinburgh. T F MacLellan Esq. President of the Royal Incorporation of Scottish Architects (who some years ago took much interest in the National Art Survey).

T Innes of Learney, Albany Herald (who comes from Aberdeen and would be a link with the North).

I G Lindsay Esq., Architect. Member of the Ancient Monuments Board (who has done much work privately in the collation of plans and drawings of period houses).

James S Richardson Esq. Inspector of Ancient Monuments (he is the nominee of the Ministry of Works).'

Although Ian Lindsay had already been called up into the Royal Engineers and was thus barred from active involvement, Lord Bute was particularly keen to secure his appointment, in view of his unrivalled experience, gained through drawing up lists of historic buildings in Scottish towns prior to the war.

Lord Bute introduced the inaugural meeting, held in the Caledonian Hotel, Edinburgh, on 19 May 1941, by stating that:

'He had received an invitation from Lord Reith, Minister of Works and Buildings, to form a National Buildings Record Council in Scotland for the purpose of establishing a register of buildings of merit illustrated by drawings and photographs. It was hoped that a Treasury grant might be forthcoming as in England but the amount was not yet known.'

Characteristically, the statement contained no explicit reference to the war. It was also a measure of the widespread threat to Scottish architecture that the Marquess had asked for an immediate lump sum of £5,000, instead of an annual small sum. As this was over twice the sum allowed for London, the £750 yearly payment eventually set was realistic. The Council went on to draw up an action list:

'Dr Baird Smith suggested that in view of recent attacks the western district should receive early attention. In the East, in addition to the Forth coastal towns, Haddington and St Andrews were cited as of special interest.'

This targeting was further refined at a second meeting a month later, the burden of the actual survey work falling upon architectural students. Edinburgh College of Art offered their senior students to the Record during the summer vacation if their expenses were met, and it was resolved to suggest to the College that:

'three students be allocated to Stirling, three to Haddington, three to Edinburgh and six to make drawings and specifications of the bridges over the Tweed and its tributaries.'

One of these students, Maurice Brown, recalled in 1990:

'During the summer of 1940 our whole world had fallen apart. It had taken the German forces barely six weeks to sweep

through the Low Countries, devastate Rotterdam, subdue France and poise themselves on the Channel coast for the invasion of Britain. Defence, of course, was the priority, but with it came a threat to our architectural heritage. In 1941 responsible authorities approached John Walkden, acting head of the School of Architecture, Edinburgh College of Art, for help in compiling a record, at least, of what might not be saved. He quickly got in touch with a number of recent graduates and other students who had dispersed at the end of the academic year and who were still waiting to take up war service. We assembled in Edinburgh on 22 July and by mid-day I was off to Stirling in a party of five with identity passes saving that we were "deputed to measure and sketch the North side of Broad Street and Darnley's House, Stirling, for official record", adding that the work was being done with the knowledge of the military and police authorities and requesting that all possible facilities should be given for the work. Thenceforth our numbers were depleted one by one as callup papers came through. Early in September only three of us were left. We took our notes and drawings back to Edinburgh and did some further work until I was called up to Devizes in October. Their completion then passed into other hands.'

The work of the Record proceeded on three fronts: the preparation of measured survey drawings, the collation of existing survey records, and photography. Although the Council regarded the first activity as primary, it was realised that the draughtsmen's time must not be wasted in duplicating earlier efforts. Ironically, even if the Record had enjoyed greater financial resources, it would have been unable in wartime to find draughtsmen to employ, as even the students began to be absorbed into the forces. However, the architectural students of the 1930s were generous in presenting relevant measured drawings, prepared as part of their course, or permitting their surveys to be traced. Moreover the upheaval of war had brought a large number of Polish soldiers to Scotland, and, realising that a few of their officers had been trained as architects, Reginald Fairlie had the inspiration to seek

permission for them to be attached to the Record. If they perhaps imported an element of nostalgia for their native architecture to their record drawings of Scotland's historic buildings, the Poles nevertheless produced work of an exceptionally high standard, and one of their number, Stanislaw Tyrowicz, was to become the Record's full-time draughtsman by the end of the war.

Pen tracings were the standard form of record drawing, and it was soon realised that their preservation was of the utmost importance. For this purpose, Lord Bute was able to offer the modern strongroom at Dumfries House, one of his seats; prints were taken from the drawings before they were despatched to the country.

To stimulate interest in the work of the Record, two exhibitions were held. The first, in July 1943, took place in the emptied National Gallery of Scotland and was organised by the Director, Stanley Cursiter. The second took place nine months later, in Glasgow Art Gallery, under the supervision of the Council's local member, Dr Baird Smith. On both occasions the original drawings were regarded as too valuable to exhibit, but, for Glasgow, some of the prints were realistically coloured in gouache. For the latter exhibition the Secretary, George Scott Moncrieff, produced a pamphlet entitled The Buildings of Scotland, and James Richardson drew the sketch for its cover. The text reveals a great deal about the Record's aims:

'The choice of subject has not been regulated by the size or importance of a building. The Council has kept in mind the need for a comprehensive central library of architectural drawings, paying considerable attention to those more modest homes of the people which make our villages and smaller buildings so delightful and which should serve to influence the architects who are to build the Scottish communities of the future.'

The compilation of the register of existing drawings was found to be a more difficult task than anticipated, but the production of such a register was the only means to avoid duplication of effort. A list of the most important modern buildings in Edinburgh was

compiled and an effort made to match them to surviving drawings. The response to circulars from architectural practices was disappointing, however, the only reply being from Wilson Paterson, who offered prints of the 'Savings Bank in Frederick Street', and the exercise seems to have been dogged by concern about the 'merit' of some of the buildings on the list. A satisfactory register was eventually completed by the octogenarian retired architect, Henry F Kerr.

The Council also attracted gifts of historic drawings for their growing collection. Although they rejected a set of stained glass cartoons as unsuitable, it is very much to their credit that they selected a number of exhibition drawings from the collection of the architect David Bryce (1803–1876), the leading exponent of the Baronial revival in Victorian Scotland, when his collection was offered in

September 1942. The acquisition of measured drawings by James Gillespie provided a link with the earlier recording activities of Sir Rowand Anderson (1834-1921), who had founded the 'National Art Survey of Scotland' in 1895, as part of the teaching method of his Edinburgh School of Applied Art. Gillespie had been one of the bursars appointed to prepare measured surveys of Scotland's historic architecture in accordance with Anderson's programme of instilling the students with a Scottish idiom of design. During the 1920s a part of this collection of 1,500 drawings had been published, and the Council may not have realised that the original designs were stored in the National Portrait Gallery. When Anderson despaired of them being published during his lifetime, he had encouraged James Gillespie to prepare his Details of Scottish Domestic Architecture in 1922, and it was the finished drawings for the plates that now entered the Record's collection.

If both modern surveys and old plans rapidly accrued to the Record, photography was perhaps the least successful area of the operations. As in the London Record, there was a strong prejudice against snap-shots. The Record was not well enough off to commission professional photographs, although it did make copies, where possible, from existing negatives, and Ian Lindsay offered to have his collection duplicated. Advice was also sought from the Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historical Monuments of Scotland, whose Secretary, Angus Graham, would have been very surprised to know that he was recognised as something more than an amateur photographer. The Commission had found that photography was most useful for recording details of buildings, and this possibly reinforced the Council's prejudice in favour of measured drawings showing the entire structure.

On the other hand, the value of existing early architectural photographs, with their clarity of detail, was fully realised, and many of the finest historic photographs in the collection, including the set of prints of Melrose Abbey, attributed to Clark, and the prints and paper negatives of John Forbes White, were subsequently purchased from the Edinburgh Photographic Society as a result of contacts established at this time. The Society itself had more than a little experience of architectural survey through their pioneering record of South Edinburgh, compiled between 1911 and 1914; a set of prints deriving from this survey was also acquired by the Record.

Looking through the Buildings Record's Minutes, it is difficult not to feel that the prolonged illness of the Marquess of Bute from 1943 resulted in a loss of impetus, because he had taken such a personal interest in its affairs. Perhaps, too, the initial flurry of activity fell away because much of Scotland remained relatively unscathed by bombing raids. The Council meetings, which had been held monthly in 1941, became quarterly and then erratic.

With the end of the war, the Council dutifully discussed the possibility of publishing the drawings as a fitting conclusion to their labours. In practice, however, there was to be

no question of the Record being wound up. It was soon realised that the Record's function was still necessary, although the real debate took place in London, with the fate of the Scottish Record being carried along in its wake. Indeed. Lord Bute had never seen the Record's work as being solely war-related, and even during the height of the bombing in London, records had been made as much to contribute to the 'artistic annals of our country' as to provide practical assistance in the creation of post-war replicas. The end of the war was, in any case, thought to herald a boom in reconstruction, during which the necessity for architectural records would be no less important.

In Scotland the Record also owed its survival to a number of local factors. It was schooled in the art of existing on a shoe-string budget because it had been born in austerity. Because most of its Council were representative, they could be easily replaced when age caught up with them. When the Secretary, George Scott Moncrieff, resigned in July 1945, Haswell Miller (1887–1979), the Keeper of the Scottish National Portrait Gallery, was appointed as a stop-gap solution for six months. He was, in fact, to serve as Secretary for seven years, as this term was successively extended. Under Haswell Miller, the Record enjoyed free accommodation in the Scottish National Portrait Gallery, and Miller was to make two important contributions to the development of the Record. His first achievement was the establishment of a purchase grant, as a result of his memorandum of 23 November 1945. Through this initiative, the rate of accessions accelerated, and books, prints and photographs flowed in. Some of these acquisitions were a result of the Record's existing contacts, like the purchase of Henry Kerr's library and sketchbooks in 1946, while others resulted from Miller's Gallery connections. His most important purchase was the collection of drawings which originated from the sale of part of the Bute collection in 1952, and these drawings by Slezer and others remain the finest of the few seventeenthcentury drawings now in the collections.

Sadly the Marquess of Bute's illness was to be a prolonged one, and his resignation was accepted with the greatest reluctance in

February 1947. Although it was assumed that Lord Hamilton, who had long served as Deputy Chairman, would take over, in fact, Hamilton also decided to resign at this moment. The Council were advised that they had the right to select their own Chairman and make new appointments to the Council; Lord Bute was thus succeeded in the chair by Lord Polwarth. This period also saw the inclusion among the Council's members of the heads of the Scottish art schools, ex officio, which formalised the arrangement whereby students, whose courses included measured drawing. augmented the collections. The Council were also active in acquiring new accessions and were frequently consulted in the development of the legislation that was to lead to the present system of protection for historic buildings. In these discussions Ian Lindsay took the leading part. Andrew Rollo, who had retired from Edinburgh City Architect's Department, carried out a number of pioneer researches among collections of historic drawings in the City's possession, as well as among those of the National Library of Scotland, including an important set of surveys by the Board of Ordnance depicting Scottish castles in the mid-eighteenth century. One of the last links with the war-time Record was broken when Stanislaw Tyrowicz, who had been appointed as the Record's draughtsman, emigrated to South Africa in 1952.

Haswell Miller's second important contribution to the Record came through his identification of a successor who could forge a pattern for its future development. While on a visit to Rome in 1951, Haswell Miller, who knew that he was about to retire and leave Scotland, met Colin McWilliam. McWilliam had just completed his architectural studies at Cambridge and had won a scholarship to Italy. This young English architect's artistic abilities were matched by his articulacy, and, after an interview in Edinburgh, which he had probably never visited previously, he rose rapidly through the ranks of the Record as draughtsman, and then Assistant Secretary, to emerge as Director after Miller retired in 1951. He joined the newly graduated Miss C H Cruft, who was already employed as a part-time researcher.

Miller's withdrawal provoked an accommodation crisis, because the Record

could no longer hope to be sheltered under the Gallery's wing, and this led to a review of the Record's status. He wrote a letter describing his own hopes for the Record's future, which also reveals that its 'amateurishness' was inspired and carefully calculated. Miller was concerned that its strengths might not be fully understood by the parent body, the Ministry of Works, who had begun to investigate its activities, with a view to absorbing the young institution. In May 1953 he wrote to the Ministry:

Before leaving I suggested to McWilliam he should draft a report on the situation as regards running and finance. This he has done very well and I am sending it to you herewith. (He has not included the "costs" part as the latest audit had not come through but I have suggested he shows you the summary of income and expenditure himself)."

'I was delighted and encouraged by the apparent good impression your Ministry's most unorthodox child seemed to make on Mr Wastie and Mr Keen when they attended the Meeting on 16 April. My team did their stuff admirably and have, I think, justified the confidence I had in them.'

'In regard to the new premises there is one point I had not considered. That is that whereas in the Portrait Gallery access could always be had to the Record material—the whole "family" there being acquainted with the set up—the Frederick Street place has to be shut up when both of the staff must be out. Clearly such an establishment must be available to the public and it is quite impossible to have it open at regular hours without a third body. Even a "Messenger" who could direct the enquirer to what he wanted. The more satisfactorily the present two do their recording the more they are liable to be out and in at irregular times.'

'Another point is the problem of safety. In the Portrait Gallery this was as complete as one could humanly expect. No smoking in the building, which is fireproofed and entirely under our control. Consequently we did not think about insurance. Now it seems essential to (a) insure what little is replaceable and (b) have photographic duplicates made of everything.'

Under Colin McWilliam's direction, the Record took on a new sense of purpose, which is clearly reflected in the Minutes. Although he prepared a number of measured drawings, he was perhaps too able an artist to relish the restricted expression of this medium, and he preferred to sketch directly on to the twin-lock index slips. Faced by unprecedented demolitions of country houses, he probably also realised that photography was vital if the handful of staff were to keep pace. Whereas, however, the earlier tradition of antiquarian recording had tended to favour the photography of isolated early architectural details. McWilliam brought a fresh eve to Scotland and an interest in decoration that was reflected in his unusually comprehensive surveys of country houses. Many of these were recorded during his researches on behalf of the newly-formed Historic Buildings Council from 1953; the recognition of the importance of the National Buildings Record's collections in the assessment of the architectural importance of structures eligible for grants brought a fresh impetus to their activities.

Colin McWilliam also initiated the photographic surveys of private collections that became so important a feature of the Record's development in Scotland. Although the Record had previously made photostats of historic drawings, the systematic photography of Scottish subjects in such collections as the Adam and Playfair Office Drawings in the Soane Museum in London not only stimulated the scholarship of Scottish architectural history, but gave a new string to the Record's bow, placing it on a par with art-historical photographic libraries in London like the Conway and the Witt collections.

These efforts and activities laid important foundations for the future. Dr David Walker, now Chief Inspector of Historic Buildings, but then a young student whose pioneering researches on Dundee architects had already brought him to the Record's attention, provides a vivid impression of its character in those early days:

The Record was housed in a cool attic area lit by a long rooflight. Within I recall seeing Kitty Cruft perched on a very high, old-fashioned stool, working by the rooflight wall; she spent a good deal of time at a

typewriter with a very small typeface which seemed to have been especially bought for the oblong small-format topographical and architect files in green cloth boards (still in use today, although a great deal thicker now than they were then). On the other side were racks of the still familiar box-files of photographs, and screens, beyond which could be heard the off-stage noises of the Portrait Gallery staff. A few moments later I was handed over to Colin McWilliam, who had only recently arrived from Rome; I told him of my researches in Dundee, and we arranged to meet again. He and Kitty were then struggling with a flood of demolitions as a result of war-time requisitioning, building-licensing making repair difficult even for those who were disposed to retain their houses, as well as estate duty, then at record levels. As the Record was financed by a slender Treasury grant and the annual subvention had not allowed for inflation, still less the end of petrol rationing, no motor car could be provided. Colin and Kitty made their way as best they could by train, bus (taxis could not be afforded), and ultimately foot. As and when the College of Art allowed me the time, and my father could spare the car, I drove Colin to demolitions near Dundee, but I still well remember the long walk we made from the main Dundee-Arbroath Road to record Panmure and the offhand reception we received from the factor when we arrived there. Panmure was both an eerie and a thrilling place, still largely without electricity and quite unaltered since the 1850s having seldom been lived in following its

reconstruction by Bryce. Its three floors of state apartments, rather low-ceilinged for their massive plasterwork (some of it 17th-century and some of it by Bryce) and the huge scale-and-platt stair, the full height of the house, made a profound impression on me, the stair especially so as seen from the attic landing; the distance to the floor and the sheer scale of the central pendant, which one could almost reach out and touch, still linger vividly in my memory.'

Since there were more demolitions than Colin McWilliam and Kitty Cruft could cope with, David Walker was taken on as a fee-paid assistant for weekends and vacations. Dr Walker further recalls:

'By 1953 the Buildings Record was housed in a small but very pleasant suite of attic rooms over the architect A H Mottram's office in 14 Frederick Street, the main office being a sunny low-ceilinged room with a big bow dormer, its walls lined with files and drawings and its floors strewn with plans and box files. The fact that it was an absolute fire-trap did not occur to us. There, whenever college vacations allowed, I came through to see the collection of Burn drawings recently received from the RIBA, beginning my lifelong interest in the work of that architect; there were also the Charles Wilson drawings, the Adam drawings which Colin had recently photographed at the Soane, and the drawings which had been bought from the Bute Collection.'

'In 1954 the National Buildings Record was taken over by the Ministry of Works, and in the following year it was absorbed into the Ministry's headquarters at 122 George Street, a warren of old-fashioned business chambers formed by Peddie and Kinnear out of the Tontine Hotel. Its most memorable feature was the huge cantilever well stair with bunkers on the landings, since most rooms still had coal fires. The new room was austere and high-ceilinged, but somewhat dark since it looked out into a light well. The room, full of plan chests, soon became almost as cramped as Frederick Street had been, but somehow never achieved the same happy informal atmosphere.'

Eventually it became necessary to shed all part-time staff, who were not civil servants; Miss Cruft left in 1956, and in March 1957 Colin McWilliam resigned to take up a post at the National Trust for Scotland, which he had been helping on an informal basis. After Colin McWilliam's departure, the Record entered a brief fallow period, but in due time its organisation was regularised and in December 1958 the temporary post of officer in charge of the Record was advertised and Miss Cruft was appointed. However, despite leading a somewhat hand-to-mouth existence during its first quarter-century (in terms of official status and prospects), the Record had nevertheless built up the capacity to make itself a useful resource for a very wide range of researchers, as its correspondence files show. Professor Alistair Rowan, now Principal of Edinburgh College of Art, but in 1962 a young postgraduate, recalls his earliest experience of the record under Miss Cruft's charge:

'In the early 1960s the Scottish National Buildings Record was housed in cramped accommodation in a house on the south side of George Street. I first experienced the allure of its collections when as a raw postgraduate student I returned from Cambridge to Edinburgh to spend the summer of 1962 working on Robert Adam's romantic houses and the history of castle-style architecture in Scotland. I remember two things very clearly: the excitement of examining box after box of photographs of Scottish buildings, many labelled in the bold sloping hand of Colin McWilliam, recently the first director of the Record and a man whose knowledge of Scottish architecture was held in awe; and the fun of working with Kitty Cruft. Here was a person, prodigal in her expense of energy on behalf of others. I had been taught in Cambridge that a good research student should make full use of the services offered by the staff of any institution; I did not anticipate the generous foraging on my behalf by Miss Cruft, who seemed to have memorised the entire intricate structure of Scottish parish boundaries, who knew exactly where all the books were amid a guddle of shelves and plan chests, and who initiated a natty little index of the work of Scottish architects, bound into small green cloth files that had

the maddening habit of flapping shut the minute you consulted them!'

The Record's long spell under the roof of the Ministry of Works is reflected in a number of accessions to the collections. The most impressive is, unquestionably, the vast portfolio containing Col. Moody's 1859 scheme for additions to Edinburgh Castle, which he lugged to Windsor Castle, where he explained to a bemused Prince Albert that its perfect proportions were based on D R Hay's current researches into aesthetics.

During the mid-1960s there were moves to regularise the official standing of the Scottish National Buildings Record, which was recognised increasingly as a valuable national asset. These discussions were influenced by various factors, among them the current plans for the London Record. At the same time. more widely-based discussions were under way, both on the systematic recording of threatened buildings and on the creation of national archaeological archives to curate the growing body of field-survey and excavation records. Deliberations by a Treasury Standing Committee on Recording Ancient Monuments and Historic Buildings resulted in the recommendation that the National Buildings Record in London be incorporated into the English and Welsh Royal Commissions, and this was effected in 1963. Discussions in Scotland between the Ministry of Public Buildings and Works and the Scottish Royal Commission at this time concluded in the decision that the Scottish Record should also be transferred, as soon as suitable accommodation for the combined establishment could be found. The change in name to The National Monuments Record of Scotland resulted from the Treasury Committee's recommendation that all monuments—prehistoric and Roman remains and medieval earthworks—should be included; the material collected was to embrace records of excavations, where no other suitable repository existed.

Thus in 1966 responsibility for the Record passed to the Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historical Monuments of Scotland, and Commission and Record moved to enlarged accommodation designed as a base

for the public archive of the latter institution and for the field-staff, drawing office and photographic departments of the former. The Commission's choice of a new home to house the conjoined bodies was a propitious omen for the future. The main building, 54 Melville Street, had been the town-house of Sir Robert Lorimer, and it still preserved much of its character, although Lorimer would have been astonished by the marquetry panel, symbolising the generation of electricity (complete with pylon), which had been installed in his rarefied, all-white drawing room and which was a souvenir of a previous tenant, the South of Scotland Electricity Board. The Record was established on the ground floor, with its main library in Sir Robert's dining room. This had been altered by him in what was a rather whimsical Gothic mode, for the Neo-Classical New Town, to accommodate a fine early tapestry. Although this was now displaced by shelves of books, much of the original detail remained, including the fretwork ceiling with gilded bosses, the elongated stone chimney-piece dated '1904', with its enchanting tiles depicting tulips and birds, and the flimsy oriel window which intensified the heat in summer and imparted a chill during the winter, Although this was before the days when historic colour schemes became *de rigueur*, the original green and gold of the ceiling was carefully restored. This rich scheme had so depressed Lorimer's family that they dubbed the room 'the funeral parlour'.

The success of the amalgamation of the two bodies can also be symbolised by the reunification of the National Art Survey drawings. For in 1958, when the National Art Survey Publication Committee was finally wound up, considerable thought had been given to the disposal of the original drawings, whose execution had been initiated by Sir Rowand Anderson and whose ownership was then vested in the Trustees of the National Gallery. The collection included a duplicate set of tracings. In a compromise, it was decided that the Commission should receive the original drawings, while the Scottish National Buildings Record should receive the tracings. The justification for this was that the originals would be more carefully preserved by the Commission, whereas the copies were better suited to the intensive use that they would receive in the Record. Happily, in 1966 this collection of outstanding national importance was again brought together.

The Commission itself had by this time an extensive collection of plans, photographs, and a small library, which resulted from the preparation of county Inventories. The marriage of the Record to an institution which was primarily concerned with field-recording and publication was not without attendant problems, but with county-based box-files of photographs, the extension of the Commission's numbering system for negatives and plans, and the maintenance of the Record slip-index of buildings and architects, users steadily found their way around the amalgamated collection. Although much of the archaeological holdings had resulted from past Inventory surveys, the Commission collection also included material gathered in the course of the Emergency Survey of Marginal Land, undertaken between 1951 and 1958 in all parts

of Scotland where an expansion of agriculture or forestry was at that time expected.

Melville Street thus housed a fast-growing collection of archaeological and architectural material. The particular appropriateness of this location was heightened through the acquisition at this time of Sir Robert Lorimer's office drawings, the largest single collection in the Record's care. The rate of accession was reflected in the necessity to brace the adjoining 56 Melville Street with steel girders to carry the ever-multiplying plan-chests, while fire-detectors and security arrangements marked the collection's new status as an important national institution. The growth of the collections also made it possible to make a more than convincing case for extra staff, and Richard Emerson was the first of the Research Assistants who have helped to keep the Record a friendly and welcoming place for the young students who still comprise the largest single category of user.

The breadth of the collections also reflected the individual character of the Scottish Record, which made it an obvious model for the Irish Architectural Archive when that institution came into being. In London, the National Monuments Record specialised increasingly in photographs, because there were other institutions which collected architectural drawings and designs for the decorative arts. From its foundation in 1834, the Royal Institute of British Architects had sought to acquire designs by earlier generations of architects, while the Victoria and Albert Museum had made judicious purchases of designs from its foundation in 1852. In Scotland there had been no such safety-net to preserve design-drawings of national importance. Although the National Galleries have incidentally acquired a number of architectural drawings, their Prints and Drawings Collection has been directed towards the world of Fine Art, while the National Museums have never included a cabinet of design like their sister institution, the Victoria and Albert Museum in London.

Although there were several important collections of architectural drawings formed by Scottish architects, including Thomas Hamilton and John Lessels, these were dispersed in the

salerooms. The Royal Scottish Academy's collection has as its core the diploma works of its members, and, while it contains many fine things, the number of drawings remains relatively small. The various attempts by Scotland's architects to found an Institute and associated local societies produced a small but important collection, but, on their successful federation by Sir Rowand Anderson in 1917, their energies were largely devoted to collecting portraits of earlier architects rather than their drawings. The preservation of the office drawings of the architect, William Henry Playfair, in the Library of Edinburgh University, following his death in 1857, was a unique accolade, reflecting his unusual status as part of the intelligentsia of the 'Modern Athens', while the office drawings of his professional brethren were all too often regarded as mere business papers and discarded. Happily, however, large numbers of drawings in the latter category have survived in family collections and institutional recordsa typical result of the Scottish tenacity in preserving potentially useful legal and financial papers; this national attribute is reflected in the superb collections of both the Scottish Record Office and the associated local repositories, as well as the National Library of Scotland. Much of the energy of the National Monuments Record of Scotland has therefore been expended in making photographic surveys of private collections that not only illuminate the history of individual buildings, but also cumulatively help to present a more rounded picture of the biographies of individual architects.

The Record's incorporation in the larger body of the Commission ensured that it now had the benefit of a highly trained professional staff of photographers, draughtsmen and investigators, who brought their expertise to many of its established activities. Refinement of the legislation designed to protect historic buildings also required the Commission to record listed buildings prior to their demolition or alteration under the various Town and Country Planning Acts.

The archaeological collections were also increasing. This was due not only to a growing awareness of the importance of excavation archives, particularly for sites that had not

been fully published, but also to the realisation that early illustrations of such monuments as stone circles and Pictish stones could make a valuable contribution to their present interpretation. Some collections of this kind were identified in the course of routine Inventory survey; for example, the series of glass slides built up by J Harrison Maxwell, which form an important link to the work of Ludovic Mann, resulted from research into excavations in Kintyre. The deposit by the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland of material relating to field-monuments and buildings gathered during the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries greatly widened the scope of the collections, the portfolios of drawings of brochs and stone circles prepared by Sir Henry Dryden in the later nineteenth century being among those most frequently consulted.

Changes in approach to the publication of archaeological excavations, which was the subject of discussion in the mid 1970s, stressed the importance of the proper curation of excavation archives as a vital adjunct to the dissemination of summary reports through journals and monographs. In consequence, the collections have been greatly increased by the working drawings, record negatives and slides for a variety of excavations in Scotland, and, as the depository for all excavations funded by Historic Buildings and Monuments (Scottish Development Department), the Record has a vital role in making this material accessible to students and researchers. Further enhancement was to come in 1983. The cardindex and maps of the Archaeology Branch of the Ordnance Survey had formed an important source of information about sites all over Scotland since the establishment of the regional office in Edinburgh in 1958. The transfer to the Commission of staff and resources of the Ordnance Survey Archaeology Branch thus created a single archive of maps, cards, photographs and plans of all known ancient monuments in Scotland, handsomely achieving the goals espoused by those who had supported the ideal of a unified archaeological archive some twenty years before. Since 1976 the collections have been further augmented by the results of the annual programme of aerial photography undertaken by the Commission itself; this embraces both archaeological and architectural sorties, as well

as those designed to record the changing industrial landscape. This photographic collection includes a high proportion of prints documenting totally new discoveries, whose recognition has led to a radically altered perception of the richness of our buried past.

The combination of the Buildings Record and the Royal Commission in 1966 thus laid the foundations of the most comprehensive assemblage of records relating to field monuments and historic buildings anywhere in the British Isles. Today it constitutes an unsurpassed and constantly updated source of information about c.100,000 sites and structures—a total that is still rapidly mounting. The initial pace of development of the conjoined Record was equally brisk, ensuring that the collection had already outgrown Melville Street by the early 1970s, and the plan-holdings had to be moved to a highly efficient, but unattractive, 'bunker' in the basement of nearby Meldrum House, in Drumsheugh Gardens. However, they were soon displaced again by the process of relocation among government offices that heralded the possibility of Scottish Devolution in 1976, and the drawings were then moved to 14 Atholl Crescent. The departure of the joint-tenant, the Ancient Monuments Branch. and the subsequent sale of these buildings, necessitated a further move. As a temporary solution, a short-term lease was accepted on 6-7 Coates Place, which had the principal advantage of being close to 54 Melville Street. If the Record was naturally sorry to exchange the sophisticated elegance of Lorimer's townhouse for the rather bewildering suites of less carefully detailed rooms at Coates Place, the accommodation of the entire collection under a single roof was a boon for both users and staff. By 1990, however, the growth of the Record had ensured that part of the plan collection had to be sent back for storage in the strengthened structure of 56 Melville Street, and serious thought had already begun to be devoted to the necessity of housing the entire Commission in a single building.

The phenomenal growth of the collection has been the result of a number of factors. Those on the archaeological side have been briefly described above; those relating to buildings are, perhaps, more complex. For example, the high cost of office accommodation has made it difficult for architectural firms to retain large numbers of drawings (often incorporating material inherited from defunct practices), and the Record has frequently had to salvage large collections when the attics and basements in which they had slumbered were upgraded for other uses. Similarly, a number of institutions have decided to deposit their collections with the Record, where they enjoy enhanced protection as well as facilities for public access. In recent years, three collections of outstanding national importance have been deposited: the plans of Edinburgh's City Architect, the Property and Building Plans of George Heriot's Trust, and the drawings of the Northern Lighthouse Board.

An initiative that will doubtless prove important for the future has been the forging of close links with the Royal Incorporation of Architects in Scotland, whose historic drawings collection has also been deposited with the Record. The Incorporation's recent pioneering survey of architecture in Scotland dating to the 1930s alerted it to the necessity of making provision for the rescue of important collections of recent drawings, which all too often were being destroyed through lack of interest and appreciation. The Incorporation also realised that the expansion of their drawings collection could provide an important cultural resource, through exhibitions and publication, for the promotion and appreciation of Scottish architecture of all periods. These rapidly growing collections are deposited with the National Monuments Record of Scotland, and the two bodies have frequently acted jointly to save historically important collections on the brink of destruction. New attitudes to architectural collections in both Europe and North America have led to the recognition of the importance of preserving entire architectural archives, rather than merely the drawings, and also to the growth of Architectural Museums, whose representatives are now interlinked through the International Congress of Architectural Museums. These new ideas are reflected by the presence of models, medals, student drawings, sketches and office files among the joint-collections of the Royal Incorporation of Architects in Scotland and the National Monuments Record of Scotland.


This may seem a long way from the immediate war-time aims of 1941, but it is surprising how many of the Record's present activities can be traced back to the earliest days. Naturally, perhaps, many areas of the collections reflect the strong links with the founders, and it seems particularly satisfactory that figures like Ian Lindsay, who did so much to promote the preservation and appreciation of Scotland's architecture, are well represented. The historical collections, however, provide links with many earlier recording initiatives. The collections of David MacGibbon and Thomas Ross, the most celebrated of all Scotland's architectural historians, are interwoven with those of the Scottish National Buildings Record, the Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historical Monuments of Scotland (of which Ross was a Commissioner), and the Royal Incorporation of Architects in Scotland. The beautiful drawings of their predecessor in the recording of Scotland's architecture, R W Billings, can be found in the collection of the Royal Incorporation. The collections of the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland lead back even further, to the dawn of Scottish archaeology, through the work of James Skene, James Drummond, and Sir Henry Dryden.

If the modern survey material produced by the Commission dominates the accessions numerically, the necessity for the care of the historical collections has placed additional demands on the Record. The proposed new home of the Commission in purpose-adapted accommodation in Bernard Terrace will not only keep it in close contact with Edinburgh's other national research and recording institutions, but also provide the opportunity to improve the standards of care through enhanced environmental control. The necessity for a conservator has long been recognised, and indeed the post is essential, given the physical nature of the collections. The dominance of tracing paper in architectural offices from the late nineteenth century makes the preservation of collections like that of Sir Robert Lorimer especially labour-intensive. Ironically, perhaps, the poor quality of the war-time paper used by the Scottish National Buildings Record in its earliest days makes this another area requiring immediate attention.

The recognition of these challenges to Record staff comes at a time when Government has completed its own review of the work of the Royal Commissions. The Consultants who conducted the Review were favourably impressed with the Scottish Record; their recognition that it was under-resourced, especially in terms of staff, however, seemed to echo a familiar theme in its history, and the recommendation of a heightened profile won widespread approval. At the same time, new approaches to field-survey and publication underline the close relationship between the Record and the survey arm of the Commission, for the 'Inventory of Ancient and Historical Monuments and Constructions of Scotland', which the Commissioners were originally charged, by Royal Warrant, to compile, is now construed as the archive of the existing National Monuments Record of Scotland, where full details of all Commission survey programmes are publicly accessible. Publication, in a variety of formats will still be a vital Commission function, but future products in this field will represent, as never before, a distillation and selection of the information in the national archive. Computerisation will take the Record into an even further phase of development—a new era—opening up rich possibilities of retrieval, and increasing accessibility on a scale which matches the rapid growth and importance of the national collections.













PROFESSOR GERHARD BERSU (1889–1964)

Negatives, drawings, notebooks and correspondence of the excavations at Scotstarvit Covert homestead 1946–7; Green Craig homestead 1946–7; and Traprain Law fort 1947. There had been a preliminary visit to Scotland in 1939, but it was not until after the Second World War that Bersu was invited to excavate these sites; the collection amply demonstrates his skills and techniques, in particular the use of colour on site drawings, already used at various sites in England, including Little Woodbury, Wiltshire, and the Isle of Man.















ALEXANDER O CURLE (1866-1955)

A O Curle was the first Secretary of the Royal Commission 1908–1913, and the material in the RCAHMS collection comprises his field notebooks, personal diaries and an illustrated excavation report of Jarlshof 1932. 







SIR H E L DRYDEN (1818-1899)

An archaeologist and antiquary, and much acclaimed for the accuracy of his plans, Dryden travelled extensively in England, France and Scotland, surveying numerous upstanding monuments. He spent several seasons 1851–91 in Orkney, Shetland and West Scotland, where he worked closely with George Petrie and surveyed many monuments, including brochs such as Lingro (now destroyed). This collection comprises handdrawn copies of the sketches, plans, and annotated drawings, many in colour, executed by W Galloway. The original drawings are in the Central Library, Northampton, near Dryden's home at Canons Ashby. Society of Antiquaries of Scotland MSS 21-24. 27, 30, 223, 493.





















































The earliest item in the collection is a catalogue of c. 1770 for composition enrichments for chimney-pieces. Scott Morton's design archive is also represented by many pages from his 'Scrapbook', consisting of cuttings and engraved designs derived from a very wide variety of sources. Two portfolios of design drawings include a design for a London drawing room of c.1880, designs for 'Redlands', Great Western Road, Glasgow c. 1895, and many designs executed by Scott Morton and Co. for works in association with

Sir Robert Lorimer. The collection also holds finished drawings and sketches by John Kinross for his Details of Italian Buildings, 1882, which were possibly presented to David Ramsay, Chief Designer of Scott Morton and Co. A superb set of pencil survey drawings of furniture was possibly subsequently also inherited from Ramsay by Peter Miller. The collection also includes a very large collection of photograph albums and loose photographs of works executed by Scott Morton and Co. from 1890-1966 arranged by type (e.g. 'Church pews', 'Communion tables', 'Bank Interiors', etc.). The manuscript material includes: a draft of Peter Miller's autobiography covering his earliest days with Scott Morton and Co.; the 'Job Number Book' which includes a chronological list of all the designers who worked in the Scott Morton Drawing Office from the 1890s, with comments on their character and abilities; and a complete list of works by Scott Morton and Co. Peter Miller's own designs included many iconographical schemes for Catholic Churches. The collection also embraces a number of plaster casts of modelled ornaments, etc. A

series of folders containing designs for 'tables', 'beds', etc., is undoubtedly by Whytock and Reid and dates from 1900–1940.





1892) under the personal supervision of the Director, Sir Rowand Anderson, From 1895. the Bursars, selected from the best draughtsmen trained by the school, were appointed each year. The surveys were undertaken during the summer and the finished pencil and colour wash drawings were prepared during the winter. The completed drawings were preserved in the school to create a library of exemplars which Anderson intended should imbue the students with a traditional Scottish idiom of design. In 1903 Anderson's school was amalgamated with the Board of Manufacturers' School of Art to found Edinburgh College of Art, but the bursaries were continued. Although attempts were made to involve the other Scottish art schools, only Glasgow played an active part. From 1907 the original drawings were preserved by the newly established Trustees of the National Gallery of Scotland, but Anderson pressed for a set of tracings to be made for the Edinburgh College's use. Anderson's concern for the NASS led to pressure from the newly founded Institute of

Scottish Architects which resulted in publication of the drawings. The National Art Survey of Scotland, Examples of Scottish Architecture from the 12th to the 17th Century appeared in four volumes between 1921 and 1933. In 1958 the Trustees of the National Galleries presented the original drawings to the Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historical Monuments of Scotland, and the tracings were presented to the Scottish National Buildings Record. In 1966 the sets were amalgamated on the foundation of the National Monuments Record of Scotland. The drawings cover a very wide range of building types from Linlithgow Palace, Holyrood and the Border Abbeys to 18th-century Country Houses like Pollok and Dumfries House. The collection includes tower houses and many urban buildings in Stirling and Edinburgh. 












WILLIAM HENRY PLAYFAIR. Designs for Hillside House, Aberdour. Elevation and plan





THE ROYAL INCORPORATION OF ARCHITECTS IN SCOTLAND'S DRAWINGS COLLECTION

From the first abortive foundation in 1840, the Institute of Scotland's Architects proposed to include drawings in their library. A collection of historic drawings was discovered in 1975 at 15 Rutland Square by Professor Alistair Rowan during his researches for the David Bryce Exhibition. This collection was subsequently deposited with the NMRS. The collecting of drawings received a new impetus at the RIAS during the 1980s when it was engaged in its pioneering survey of 1930s drawings. Alarmed by the rate of destruction. the RIAS decided to re-found its drawings collection. The intention is to build up a cabinet collection of representative drawings by Scotland's architects primarily for exhibition and educational purposes. In this work the RIAS liaises closely with the NMRS, (where the drawings are deposited in the rooms devoted to the RIAS collection) and the Scottish Record Office as well as other relevant depositories in Scotland. The earliest drawings in the collection are the scheme for Hangingshaw by James Adam of 1766, and there are also designs by W H Playfair, James Gillespie Graham, William Burn, George Meikle Kemp, R W Billings, George Shaw Aitken, etc. (many noted individually in this catalogue). Although twentieth-century drawings have dominated the recent accessions (with large collections like the James Miller office drawings), many fine early drawings have been added, of which the most important is the David Neave album and two presentation drawings for the Observatory on Calton Hill, Edinburgh, by W H Playfair of c.1820. The collection of student drawings is one of its strongest areas.







THE SCOTTISH INDUSTRIAL ARCHAEOLOGY SURVEY

A large collection of over 1500 records carried out by the Scottish Industrial Archaeology Survey, founded in 1977, to carry out systematic surveys of significant industrial monuments in Scotland, and sponsored, initially, from rescue archaeology funds administered by the Department of the Environment. The Survey was merged with RCAHMS in 1985, and its staff and archive became permanent members of the Commission's staff and organisation. The records have now been incorporated in NMRS and a Catalogue of Records: Scottish Industrial Archaeology Survey 1977-85 was published by RCAHMS in 1989, listing the surveys both by Region and District and also thematically (e.g. 'Ceramics', 'Town Gas', 'Windmills'). This also includes a list of the Survey's Thematic Studies including: Suspension Bridges; Hand-Cranes; Horizontal Watermills; Vertical Watermills; Windmills and Wind-Engines; 'Dickie' Windpumps, etc.





A large collection of personal and office papers relating to the life and works of this architect, including: family photographs; an extensive collection of notebooks and sketchbooks containing his reminiscences, notes for jobs in hand and drafts for lectures, publications and literary projects; a series of Memo Books 1948-1962 with jottings on each day's activities and expenses; office files relating to jobs including works for the Carnegie Trust Dunfermline, (Library, Birthplace and Memorial Museum), Hydro Electric Board, etc; press-cutting files on varied subjects; folders of photographs of executed works (including restoration of Brucefield House, Aberfoyle Pavilion, etc.); typescripts of publications and lectures, including an appreciation of the architect, H L Honeyman; printed literature relating to the work of the Carnegie Trust in Dunfermline; an album of photographs recording a visit to France and Italy in 1956; a file of letters of congratulation on the award of his OBE, etc. Presented by his family per Roger Emerson, 1987.

REV. JOHN SIME (1790-1864), Antiquarian

engravings of Scottish and English castles, churches and towns. Sime was ultimately Chaplain to Trinity College Hospital in Edinburgh and, after its demolition, James Gillespie's Hospital. He was an enthusiasitic antiquarian, and the album reflects his wide interests and shows evidence of his early architectural training. It incorporates an inkedup early sketchbook of c. 1804–1807. Surveys include in Scotland: the Lawnmarket, Edinburgh; Edinburgh University; Craigmillar Castle; Borthwick Castle; the Border Abbeys; St Andrews: Cowdenknowes House: Culross Abbey House: Dunfermline: Perth Town Churches and a plan of Pittenweem, etc. Surveys in England include: Carlisle Cathedral; Walwick Grange; Alnwick; Warkworth; Norham; Ford Castle and Church, etc.

Folder, Insc.: 'Scrolls and Plans J Sime', including a large collection of architectural designs, antiquarian surveys and engravings, etc., by John Sime. The designs include: 'Plans for Repairing the Canongate Church 30th Nov 1815 Charles XII', an unidentified item, a church 1810, etc. The surveys include: Doocots at Valleyfield copied from the plans; Melrose Abbey; Borthwick Castle; St Andrews, Durham; Moray House, Canongate.

The collection also comprises a number of architectural drawings collected by Sime, including: studies of the orders; a perspective view of a church like St Pauls, Covent Garden; and a design for an 'Adam' chimney-piece collected by Sime.

(The John Douglas drawings (see above) were

extracted from this folder).

The latter is evidently a competition entry as his own name 'John Sime at Mr David Sime's head of Lawnmarket Edinburgh' has been concealed by a flap secured with sealing wax. The Sime Collection was presented by the Company of Merchants of the City of Edinburgh 1985, who have retained the original drawings for *Edinburgh in Olden Time* and William Douglas's survey perspectives of Trinity College Hospital.





'Material Book,' commencing 16 May 1822-24 July 1828, listing timbers, etc., used by job and client.







HAROLD RAMSAY TAYLOR (1864–1922), Architect

An engineer by profession, Thom's interest in prehistoric megalithic sites developed as a hobby but became a second career, resulting in this collection and over 120 publications. Copies of the latter, many annotated by Thom, are also held in the NMRS.

CAPTAIN FREDERICK W L THOMAS (d.1885), Royal Navy

While a lieutenant in command of the survey vessel 'Woodlark', engaged in the Admiralty survey of Orkney, Shetland and the Western Isles, Thomas sketched, surveyed, took notes and photographed numerous upstanding monuments. His notes, written in HMSO Naval Stores logs, formed the basis of his

articles in the Proceedings of the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland and Archaeologia Scotica. He continued his research in Edinburgh, having drawings and plans by H Dryden (held by the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland) traced and copied by W Galloway. Society of Antiquaries of Scotland MSS 29, 33-38.

TRAPRAIN LAW

The visitors' book from the excavations in 1921-2 by J E Cree and A O Curle, includes signatures of A T Curle (son of A O Curle), J S Richardson, C S T Calder, various members of the Cree family and visitors from as far away as New Zealand.

SIR FRANCIS TRESS BARRY (1825-1907)

Collection of original excavation photographs, sketch drawings by John Nicolson and correspondence, mainly with Dr Joseph Anderson, relating to the research and excavations undertaken by Sir Francis Tress Barry during his visits to Keiss Castle, Caithness. Tress Barry became interested in archaeology, collecting artefacts and excavating about twenty sites, mainly brochs,

between 1890 and 1904. Apart from a paper read to the Society of Antiquaries of London in 1899 describing the discovery and excavation of several brochs, and an outline by Joseph Anderson in the Proceedings of the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland in 1901, Barry unfortunately did not publish his work, and this collection provides the only record of his research in the NMRS. 




TOWNLEY HALL. Design by James Playfair

THE TROTTER ALBUMS OF GEORGE

Two albums containing a large collection of sketches, presentation drawings, working drawings and a few contract drawings (many at full size) for architectural woodwork and furniture by Trotter of Edinburgh, the city's leading furniture maker. Many of the schemes in the Gothic style were executed for the architect James Gillespie Graham, to the design of A W N Pugin. Including designs for most of the firm's major commissions: at Taymouth Castle; George Heriot's Hospital; Floors Castle; Mavisbank; Crom Castle, Northern Ireland; and many unidentified. The volumes also include source material used by the firm in their design activities and a collection of tracings after designs by George

Bullock. The papers were probably salvaged by George Potts, who was one of the employees who entered into a partnership as Potts, Cairnie and Ray to continue the firm when Charles Trotter (son of the founder, William) withdrew c.1850. The partnership went into sequestration c.1860 and was wound up. The drawings date from c.1815–1860. See Ian Gow, 'New Light on Late Trotter' Country Life, August 11, 1988, pp. 100–103. Purchased 1985 with the aid of a 50 per cent grant from the National Art Collections Fund.






