Description

Remains of rig and furrow cultivation extend across a field immediately to the south of the Law quarry (NT58SE 136). The area measures about 410m from ENE to WSW by up to 100m transversely and slopes gently to the N. The individual rigs are aligned from ESE to WNW and measure up to 8m in breadth and 0.3m in height. The field was called 'Law Bank' on an estate map of 1804 and belonged to a now demolished farm that stood at NT 5536 8372 (NAS RHP 1726). The same map depicts the straight S boundary of this field as a regular 'belt of planting', presumably indicating that it was established recently separating the bank from the larger field to the S and providing a terminus ante quem of c.1800. Description

At the foot of the NW flank of North Berwick Law there are the remains of a small building. These remains comprise a concrete floor, measuring 5.75m from NE to SW by 1.48m transversely, and a short set of (slightly displaced) concrete steps which has provided entry to the NE end of the NW (downhill) side. The building, which presumably once had a timber superstructure, appears to have been divided into two compartments, probably with a connecting door or space. The probable remains of a prehistoric burial were found near North Berwick Law in the middle of the 19th century. Ferrier notes (1878, 29) that 'A few years ago a ploughman, working in a field lying a little to the east of the Law, came upon a stone cist containing a skeleton, which, on being handled, fell to dust. The stone cist, however, still remains. Some flint arrows which were found in the cist were removed to Leuchie House [NT58SE 47], and there may be seen by the curious'.
 Leuchie House, also sometime known as North Berwick House, was the home of Sir Hew Hamilton-Dalrymple, (1814-1887), who owned a considerable amount of land and property in and around North Berwick, and it must be a fair assumption that the cist was found on his land. The present whereabouts of the arrowheads is not known; Leuchie House is now run by a charity offering respite care.

There is a commemorative monument on the summit of North Berwick Law, erected in 1959, that takes the form of a brass plate 0.78m in diameter, giving distances and directions around the compass to places within view, set into the top of a mortared stone pillar 0.93m high, the top of which is formed by a single piece of sandstone with a moulded outer edge. An inscription on the plate records that the monument was 'Erected by his many friends to the memory of John Wallace Menzies, Solicitor and Town Clerk in North Berwick 1889-1956'. Around the foot of the indicator there is a low octagonal plinth, measuring about 2.4m across, formed by a granite kerb which retains a surface comprising stones set in cement. The pattern of these stones includes four triangles (edged by metal bars) of small edge-set stones, which point to the cardinal points. The areas between these triangular settings have been filled with cobble-sized stones.

The wasted remains of this fort and its outworks occupy the rocky summit of North Berwick Law. Roughly triangular with rounded corners on plan, it measures internally up to 103m from NE to SW by the same transversely, and the circuit was designed to include slightly flatter ground off to the E and W of the summit boss. The principal line of defence is a single wall (A) now reduced to no more than a light band of rubble about 4m in thickness and 0.6m in external height, which is visible for most of the circuit. The best preserved segment is on the SE where a 5.5m long stretch of outer facing-stones is visible. There is now no obvious indication of where the entrance was located but it is more than likely to have been at the NW corner where the modern path follows a broad and smooth gully. Two terraces (B) on the steep ground to the E of the fort are probably the remains of outworks. They lie 14m and 23m E of the main wall respectively, both are accompanied by vestiges of an internal quarry scarp, and both follow the contours, the upper for a distance of at least 60m, the lower in discontinuous stretches for the same distance. One other stretch of wall on the N flank may also be related (C). Three further outworks were identified by RCAHMS in 1954 and by the OS in 1975. The

Field visit

The discontinuous remains of what was probably a boundary bank are situated on the steep W flank of North Berwick Law, extending for a distance of at least 240m from NT 55425 84246 to NT 55373 84016. The central section is best preserved and here it survives as a terrace some 4m in width and 1.5m in height, with an accompanying quarry scarp along the uphill side. At its NNE end the bank turns downhill and becomes a slighter feature, while at its SSW end it becomes a faint scarp before petering out.

The purpose and date of the feature are not known but it does not seem to form part of the defences of the fort proper (contra Feachem 1963); it may be a more prosaic feature of later date, perhaps related to the management of grazing animals or the protection of a plantation, joining to another bank further downhill (NT58SE 164). A slight bank which crosses the terrace at NT 55417 84181 is upcast from a shallow trench that may have carried a cable to the Observation Post on the summit (NT58SE 65). It is visible for about 50m and runs from WNW to ENE.
