Archaeological Metal Detecting Survey

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1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 General

Seed & Co. will be planting trees on land to the north-west of Greenlaw and to the immediate south of the steep sided valley for the Blackadder Water known as Greenlaw Dean (NGR: NT 69540 46919).

Scottish Borders Council requested a metal detector survey (MDS) to be carried out within an area of the northern end of the proposed planting area. The area to be surveyed covers the location of a find spot of Roman coins and pottery (RCAHMS NT64NE13) and is to the immediate south of the location of the Corbie Heugh Coin Horde (RCAHMS NT64NE10) which comprised of gold and silver coins from Edward III (1327-1377).

This report describes the results of this metal detector survey, which took place on 12th February 2013. The project was commissioned by Seed & Co on behalf of Mr Peter Leggate.

1.2 Aims and Objectives

The objectives of the programmes of archaeological works were

- 1. To conduct a MDS across the proposed planting area in order to detect and recover artefacts of archaeological or historical origins.
- 2. To produce a report on the results of the fieldwork.

1.3 Weather Conditions

Cold, overcast, dry weather prevailed over the day of the survey.

2. WORKING METHODS

Because of the small area (c.12150 m²⁾ to be covered by the MDS it was scanned without the use of grids or transects. Detecting took place in a north-east/south-west systematic linear pattern, running parallel to existing fencelines, c.1.5m apart, to ensure that the whole area was covered.

No discrimination was set on the equipment.

3. RESULTS OF THE SURVEY

All the objects found were modern (20th-21st century in date). They included coins, fence staples and machinery parts. These were recorded in the field and were not retained.

Coins

Two coins were identified. Both were modern decimal two pence coins of Elizabeth II (1978 and 2004).

Fence staples

Numerous modern fence staples were recovered; these were found all along the length of and in the vicinity of the modern fence line.

Machinery Parts

Two plough tips and four sheared bolts were identified.

4. CONCLUSIONS

All the material discovered was of 20th-21st century date. None of the material was removed from the site.

CFA recommend that no further work is required in mitigation.

The project archive, comprising all CFA record sheets, maps and reports will be deposited with the National Monuments Record of Scotland (NMRS). A summary statement of the results of this programme of work will submitted for publication in *Discovery and Excavation in Scotland* 2013 (Appendix 1).
